



GOOSEBERRIES

Gooseberries come in shades of green, yellow, red and pink. They have a unique, tart, grape-like flavor which is perfect for pies and cobblers. Many of the newer varieties have smaller thorns, which makes harvesting easier. Gooseberries typically ripen in late June.

CAPTIVATOR	Very sweet, medium to large, pear-shaped fruit. Pink when fully ripe in late July. Thornless, vigorous and productive. Good disease resistance.
HINNOMAKI RED	Tart-skinned variety with sweet, red flesh perfect for baking or fresh eating. Self-fertile, good disease resistance ripens in July.
INVICTA	Vigorous, thorny shrub of spreading habit produces heavy crops of tart, green-white fruit. Great for baking, preserves, and fresh eating.
OREGON CHAMPION	Medium to large light greenish-yellow berries. Flavor sweetens as it ripens. Fruit holds well on bush. Very productive, 3-5' tall. Starts bearing in its second year. Zones 4-10. Ripens early.
POORMAN	Medium-large reddish-pink berries are oval, wine-red with lilac blush when ripe. Excellent, highly flavored, sweet-tart fruit. Delicious eaten fresh. Also fine in pies and jams. Vigorous, reliably productive, mildew-resistant bush. Considered the best American variety. Zones 4-10. Ripens late.
RED GEORGE	Compact, disease resistant, self-fertile variety yields large crops of dark red, nearly black fruit. Zones 3-8
WELCOME	Medium to large, light green fruit turns pink when ripe. Sweet-tart flavor. Good all purpose. Grows to 5'.

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
